- 1. First, I wish to congratulate you, Madam Chair, and the members of the bureau for being elected for this session of the IOM Council.
- 2. IOM and Thailand have **a long history of partnership**, even before we became a Member of the organization. We are committed to **continue working closely** with the IOM to better respond to the evolving dynamics and challenges of migration.
- 3. We wish to highlight one pressing issue in international migration an area our partnership with the IOM can be further enhanced. Currently, over 40 million or 1 in 8 migrants worldwide are children. At all stages of the migration process, migrant children are more vulnerable to violence, abuse, exploitation, trafficking and detention, further intensified when they are unaccompanied or separated from their migrant parents. We need to address these children's needs with specific care, protection and solution, and strive to promote their attainment of rights enshrined in the CRC, particularly access to education, health care and family unity.
- 4. In the context of Thailand, all migrant children born in the country are eligible to register for birth certificates. They can have access to affordable basic health services, which costs only 11 US dollars per year. Our "Education for All" policy also grants access to 15 years of free education in the public school system to all children, regardless of immigration status. Nonetheless, challenges remain due to several reasons, such as language barrier, parent's job insecurity, as well as lack of necessary equipment to facilitate access to online classes during the COVID-19 pandemic. We will continue to address the existing gaps to ensure inclusivity and promote their learning opportunities, health and well-being, in line with our ongoing efforts to advance SDG 3 and 4.
- 5. Thailand has also geared up the implementation of our pledge on alternatives to detention for migrant children, and we thank the IOM for the support provided to line agencies.
- 6. In leading up to the International Migration Review Forum (IMRF), Thailand has been working on a number of initiatives, including our participation in Migration Governance Index (MGI) process, the results of which can contribute to future migration management policies. As one of the GCM Champion Countries, Thailand also started a series of consultations with other Champions in the region to accelerate action to achieve GCM to discuss, among others, the issue of the COVID 19 pandemic and its adverse socioeconomic impacts on migrants.

- 7. Thailand stands ready to share our experiences. We look forward to working closely with IOM and our friends on ensuring that IMRF contribute to a better change to migrants' lives and a better migration governance.
