

IOM assessed over **3,972 points of entry** (POE), including airports, land border crossing and blue border crossing points, **in 177 countries** 



#### Information campaigns

Over 3.5 million reached through IOM awareness campaigns on COVID-19

#### Health

- 1300+ health/medical staff mobilised to provide health services and capacity-building
- 3,500 individuals trained on COVID-19 related issues to support continuation of services
- 225,000 people assisted through IOM Mental Health Psychosocial Support in over 25 countries.
- Over 6 million health screenings of travellers for COVID-19

### Camp Coordination/Camp Management

• Working to facilitate isolation, physical distancing and, where appropriate, quarantine.

#### Sanitation

Over 3,000 handwashing stations established



IOM estimates over 2.75 million migrants stranded across the world:

Migrants, once stranded, are at a **higher risk of abuse**, **exploitation and neglect**. The loss of livelihood can increase vulnerability and exposure to exploitation.

#### Since the lockdown,

- IOM has received requests to assist nearly 115,000 stranded migrants to safely and voluntarily return home.
- IOM has assisted over 6,000 migrants to return using existing AVVR programming.
- Estimates include **976,000 stranded** in Asia and the Pacific, and **1,257,000 stranded** in the Middle East and North Africa.




First Line of Defence (FLoD)

19 countries covered by global UN-IOM arrangement.

14 countries have signed the local MOU, among which:


- 9 countries are receiving testing support;
- 6 countries are receiving clinical care and isolation services;
- 2 countries are receiving ex-country telehealth services.





#### **Structural Adjustments**

- Approximately USD 14 Million in proposed savings
- Hardest hit programmes: Visa Application and Health Assessments
- Approx. 575 staff members moved to part-time, with 250 moved to retrainment
- 140 positions abolished
- Staff growth slowed between 2019 and 2020
- Non-staff decline of 20%





### Programme and Budget for 2020

- Administrative Part of the Budget: CHF
   52,242,614 (unchanged)
- Operational Support Income: USD 123 million (unchanged)
- OSI Drawdown USD 10.1 million
- Operational Part based on confirmed funding: increased from USD 1.7 billion to USD 1.9 billion
- Largest increases relate to Movements,
   Emergency and Post Crises Programming,
   Regulating Migration, Facilitating Migration and
   Migration Health







### Programme and Budget for 2021

- Administrative Part of the Budget: CHF
   52,242,614 (unchanged)
- Operational Support Income: USD 128 million (4% increase)
- Operational Part based on confirmed funding so far: increased from USD 858.3 million to USD 913.4 million
