I. Quick facts on unearmarked funding


- Established in 2017, the MIRAC is IOM's entry point for unearmarked funding
- Unearmarked contributions enable IOM to respond to strategic needs and to finance important core functions and functional areas
- In 2020, IOM received a total of USD 31.3 million in voluntary unearmarked contributions equivalent to 1 % of total IOM revenue
- The MIRAC grew from 5 donors in 2017 to thirteen donors in 2020
- In 2020, multiyear agreements for unearmarked funding were ongoing with Belgium, Denmark, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom

III. Allocations of 2020 unearmarked funding

Unearmarked contributions received in 2020 are being used to:

- Strengthen engagement with the United Nations (USD 6.9 million): UNMN Secretariat, Migration Network Hub, Peace & Security Pillar and UN Security Council
- Enhance operational effectiveness (USD 5.9 million): AAP, Global CCCM Cluster, COVID-19 operational guidance, disability inclusion, CBI, MCOF revitalization, strengthening of IOM vaccination capacities
- Support the application of the IGF (USD 4.9 million): RBM, donor agreement templates, beneficiary data and distribution management system, Pathways Pool, IATI, CRM, We Are All In platform, internal justice



III. Allocations (continued)

Unearmarked contributions received in 2020 are being used to:

- Expand the engagement of IOM on data and innovation (USD 3.7 million): Migration Data Strategy, data hubs in 6 regional offices, Displacement Tracking Matrix
- Strengthen IOM policy capacity, coordination and knowledge management (USD 3.6 million): Policy Hub, migration data governance policy, legal identity, international migration law, EMM2.0, Migration and Sustainable Development Strategy, knowledge management tools and systems
- Enhance organizational effectiveness (USD 3.5 million): MiMOSA upgrades, staff wellbeing and mental health, e-PHR upgrades



III. Allocations (continued)

Unearmarked contributions received in 2020 are being used to:

- Contribute to the Core Budget/OSI 2021 (USD 2.2 million)
- Support the IOM Development Fund (USD 0.6 million)
- Develop strategic communications (USD 0.4 million): public communications awareness raising of key issues including attitudes towards migrants





IV. Key outcomes reached in 2020

- IOM has deepened engagement with the United Nations
- IOM has evolved as a reliable policy actor
- IOM operations have become more efficient, principled and accountable
- IOM has progressed towards the realization of a fit-for-purpose internal governance system
- IOM has expanded its engagement on migration data and innovation




IOM funding mechanisms

- I. The Migration Emergency Funding Mechanism (MEFM)
- Established in accordance with Council Resolution No. 1229 of 5 December
 2011 to bridge the gap between the start-up of emergency operations and the subsequent receipt of donor funding
- Funded by voluntary contributions, the Fund's target balance is USD 30,000,000. However, the current balance is just under USD 700,000.



Shelter distribution for Rohingya refugees in Kutupalong settlement Credit: © Olivia Headon / IOM






II. The Global Assistance Fund (GAF)

- Emergency fund that offers **personalized direct protection** and **sustainable assistance** to migrants in vulnerable circumstances across the globe.
- Assists: victims of Trafficking, victims of Abuse, Violence and Exploitation, Unaccompanied Minor Children and migrants with severe medical conditions.
- Established in August 2000 over **3,600 vulnerable migrant** women, men, girls and boys assisted since then.
- In 2020: 229 migrants assisted.
- Funded by voluntary contributions, the Fund's target balance is USD 2,000,000

Currently out of funds, seeking new donors.

III. Rapid Response Transportation Fund (RRTF)

- The RRTF was established in late 2000 to facilitate joint operations between IOM and UNHCR, specifically the safe and expedient movement of persons of concern to UNHCR.
- Over the years, the RRTF has enabled IOM to respond rapidly and efficiently to emergency humanitarian transportation requirements in close collaboration with UNHCR.
- Funded by voluntary contributions, the Fund's target balance is USD 5,000,000
- Current balance: USD 848,801
