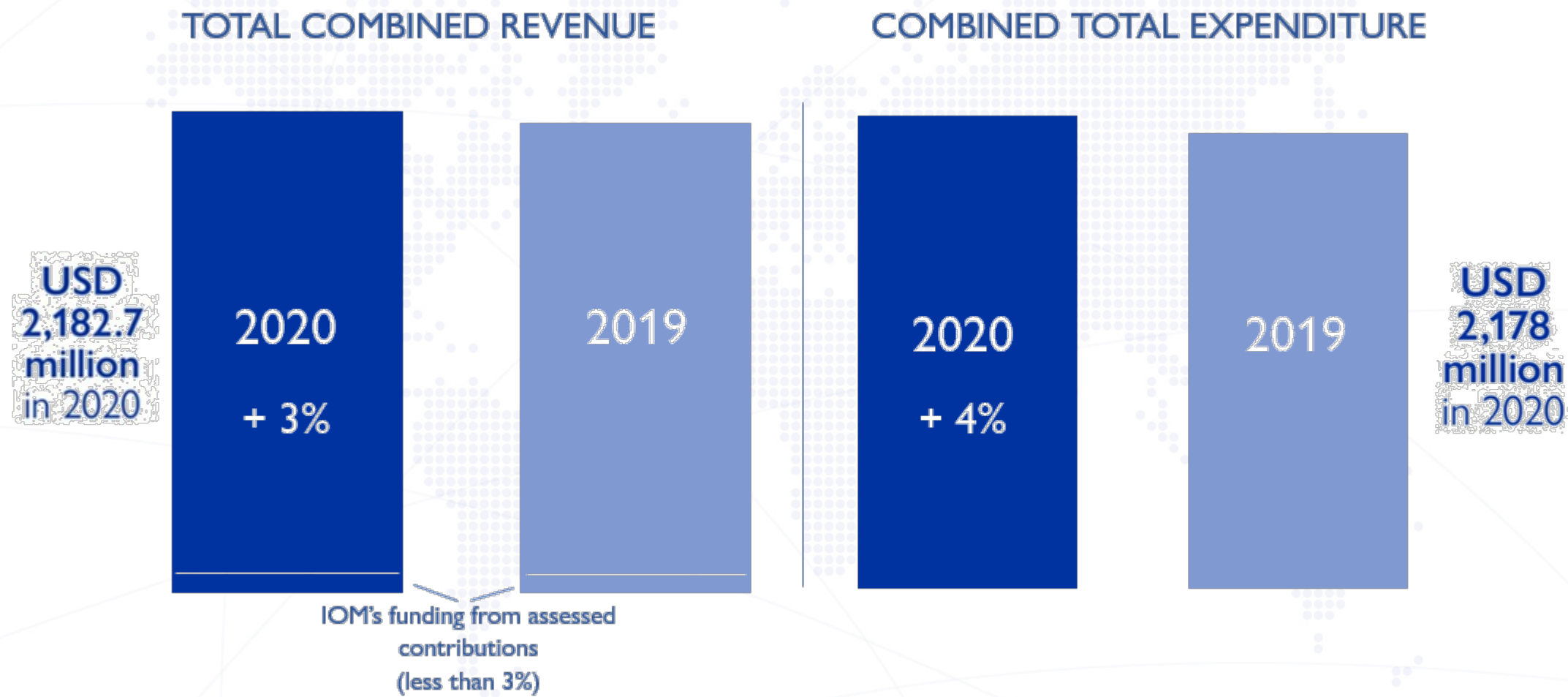

Resettlement and Movement Management

- IOM supported **40,536** refugees and other persons in situations of vulnerability in 27 states.
- Of which, **3,063** beneficiaries relocated from Greece, Italy and Malta to 12 destination countries.
- Significant operations out of Afghanistan, Greece, Jordan, Lebanon and Turkey.
- Top three resettlement countries: USA, Canada, Sweden.



COVID-19 Stranded and Vulnerable Migrants

- Direct support to help **2,677** stranded migrants return
- Return-related assistance to **107,212** stranded migrants
- **167, 216** beneficiaries supported in transit centres
- Case-management support to **73,869** vulnerable or stranded migrants

Assistance also provided for food, shelter, childcare, health assistance, psychosocial counselling, risk communication, COVID-19 preventative measures.

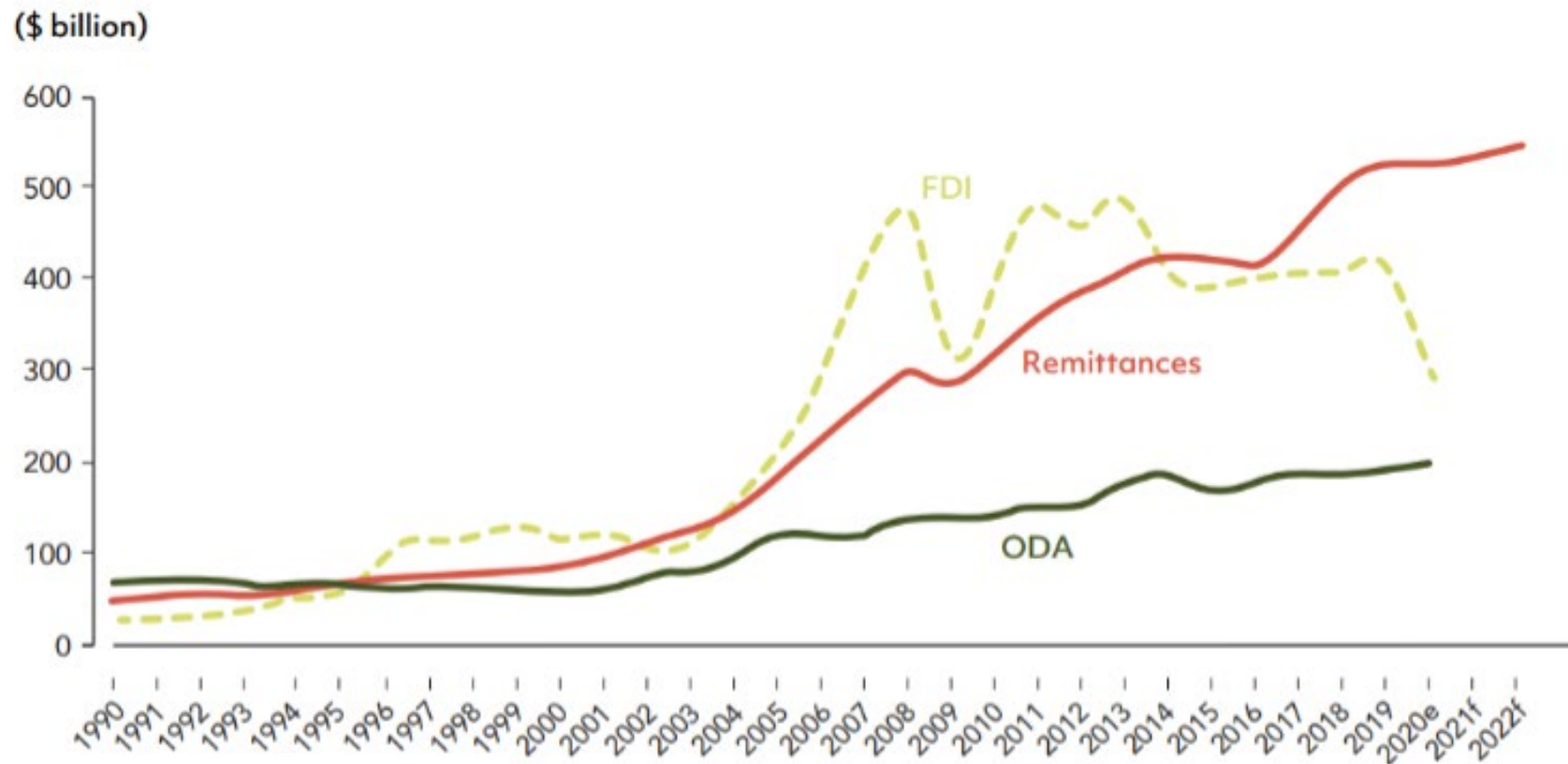


Staff Impact of COVID-19



- During 2020, **1,097** employees contracted COVID-19
- Robust COVID-19 surveillance and case management systems were developed
- Staff Welfare Services:
 - 3,335 sessions held with 2,563 staff;
 - 1,879 consultations held with managers;
 - 215 webinars and 236 well-being sessions attended by 2,792 staff.

Migrant Inclusion in COVID-19 Vaccination

- IOM obtained **direct reporting on 177 countries** on migrant inclusion in national plans versus practice.
- **A lack of clarity remains in over 55 countries** regarding the level of access to the vaccine that different categories of migrants already have or will be able to have in practice.
- **Examples of good practices to address barriers:**
 - *Accepting any form of identification document.*
 - *Pro-actively reaching out to migrant communities, with relevant language/.*
 - *Deploying mobile vaccination teams to reach remote areas.*
 - *Guaranteeing that there will be no reporting to immigration authorities following immunization.*
 - *Granting residency rights or visa extensions for migrants in irregular situations, to ensure they can access social benefits, including health care.*
- **Continued advocacy** remains critical, as well as targeted **risk communication and community engagement** to ‘**leave no one behind**’.

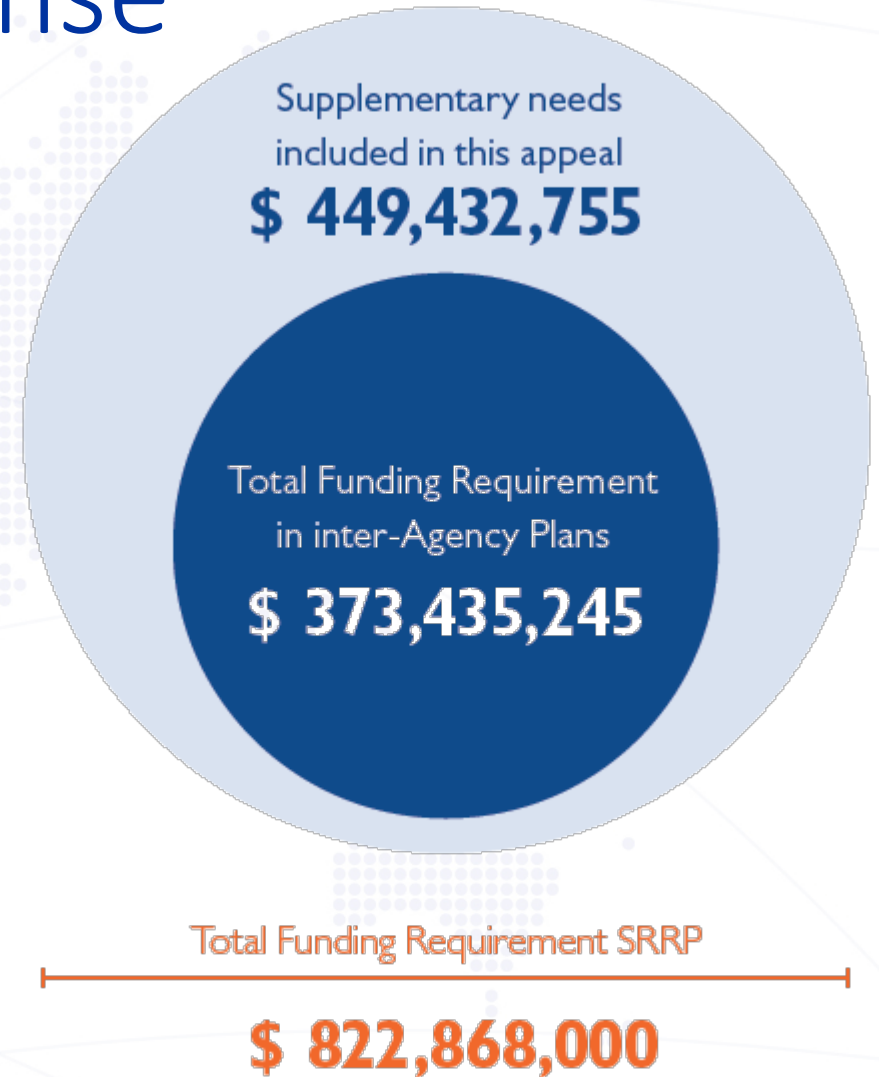

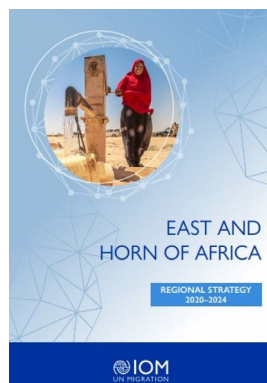
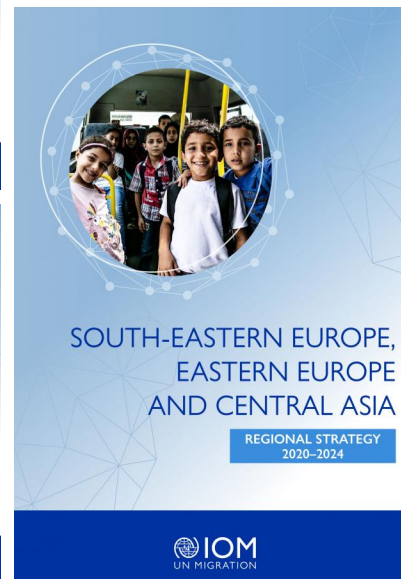
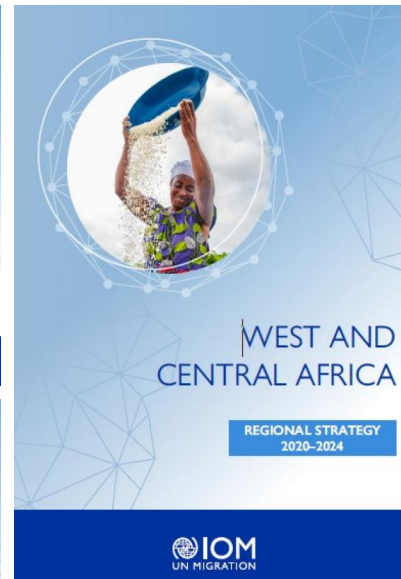
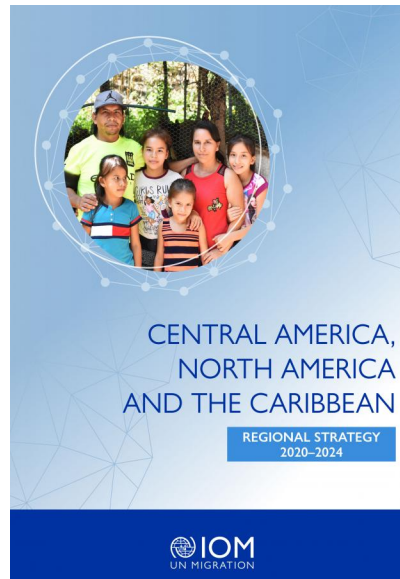
Strategic Objective 1: Ensure continuation of essential services, mitigate risks and protect displaced persons, mobile populations, and host communities.

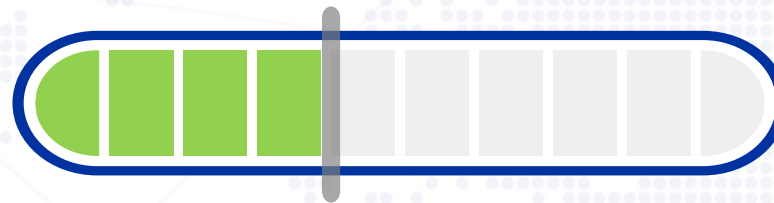




Regional and Continental Strategies 2020-2024

Completion Rate of the IGF (excluding WS3)



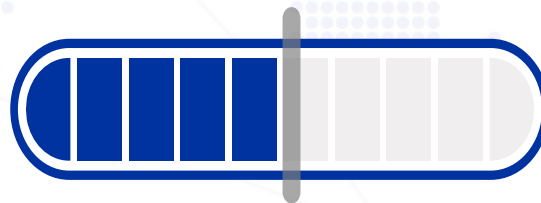

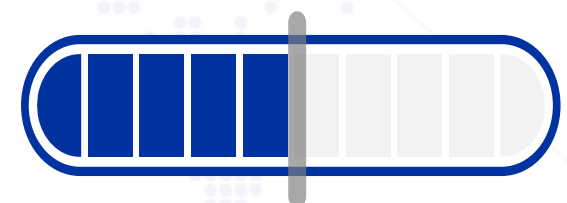

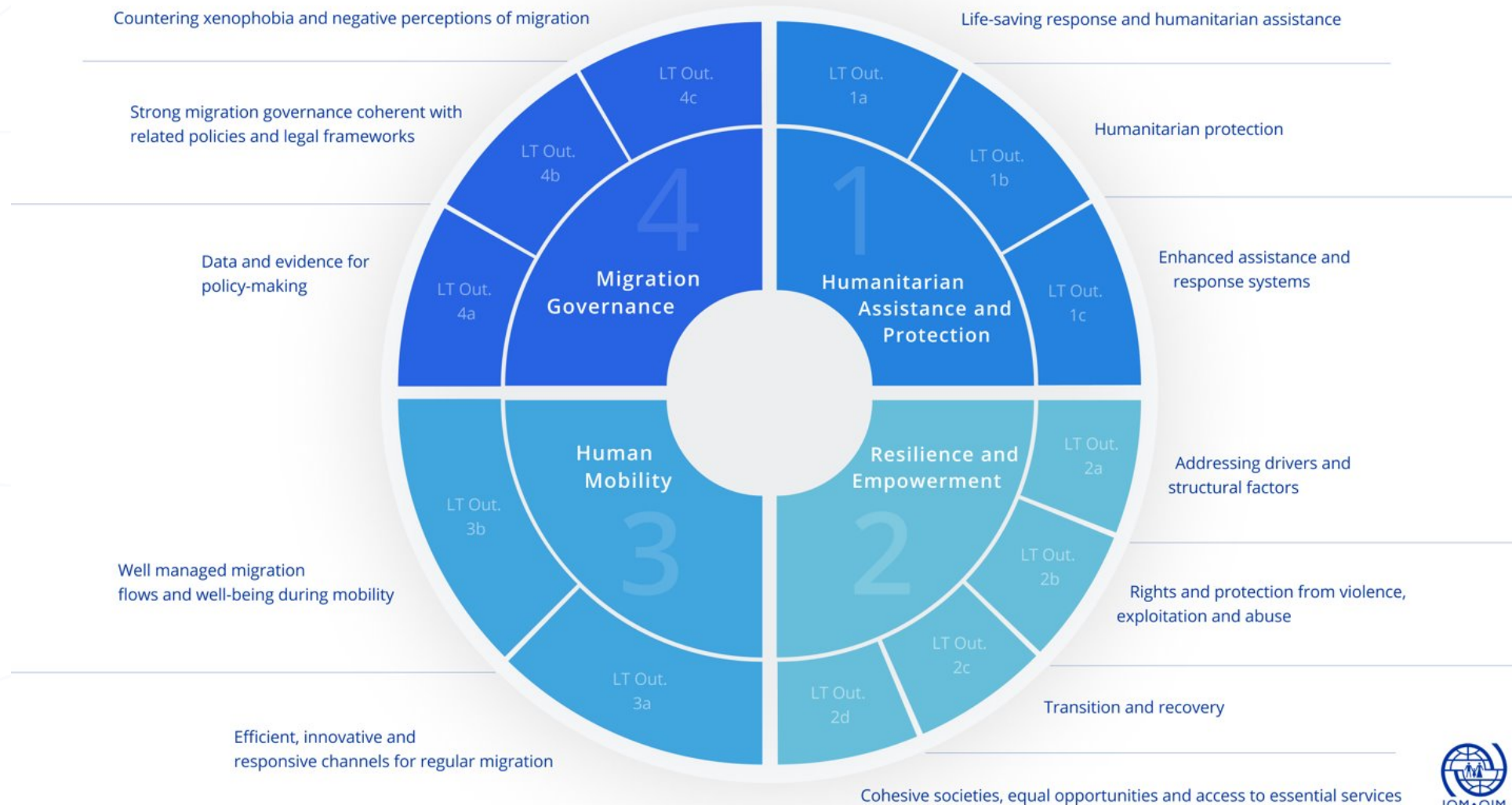
