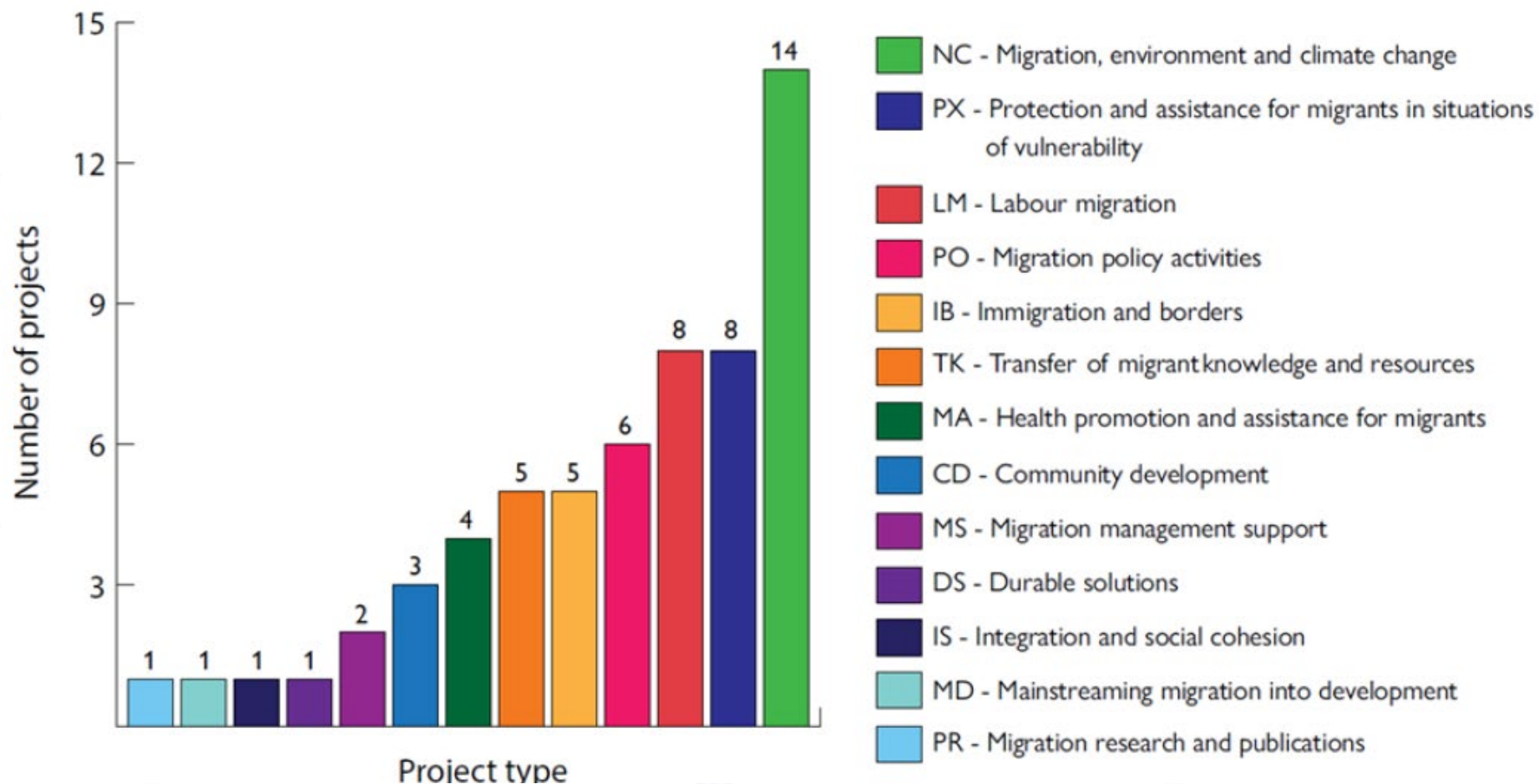

Number of projects approved in 2022 by project type



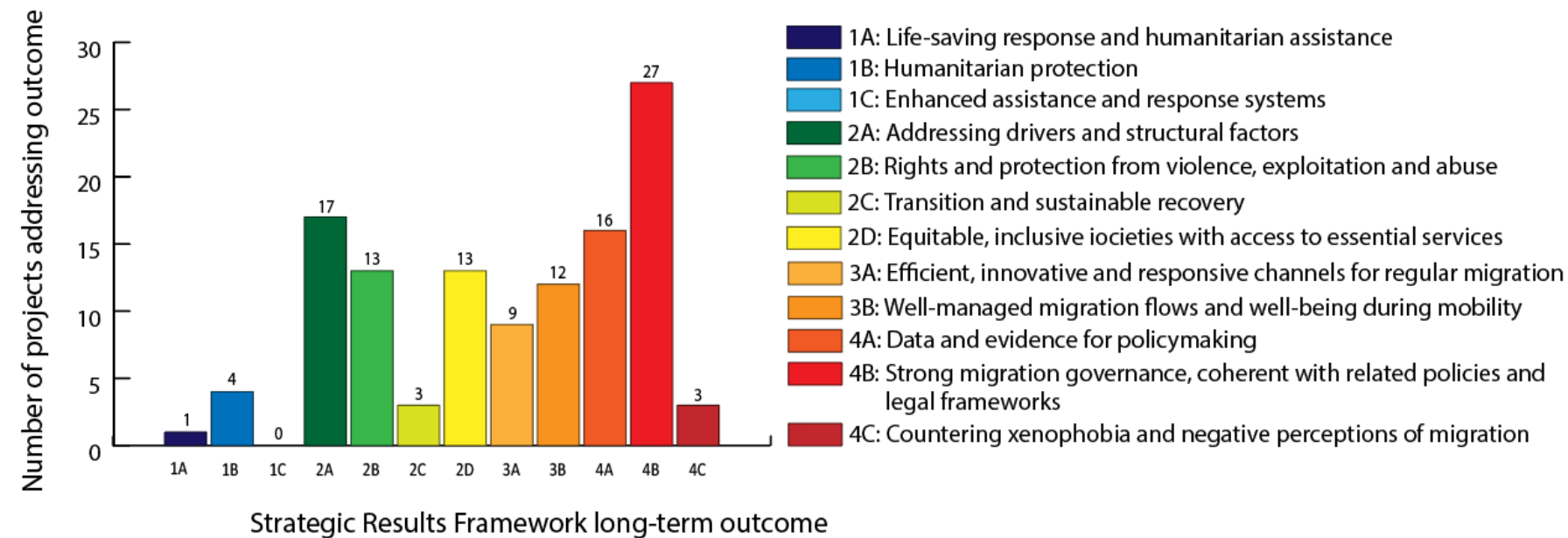
The most demand was for projects in the following project type categories:

- *Migration, environment and climate change*
- *Protection*
- *Labour migration*

Number of projects approved in 2022 by long-term outcome of the Strategic Results Framework

The majority focused on:

- Strong migration governance, coherent with related policies and legal frameworks (outcome 4B)
- Addressing drivers and structural factors (outcome 2A);



AWARENESS-RAISING CAMPAIGNS



- **“Do the Right Thing,”** brings attention to the migration, environment and climate change nexus.
- **“Look Forward Give Back,”** which focuses on diaspora initiatives

***400 per cent increase in traffic to the campaign websites over the last year**

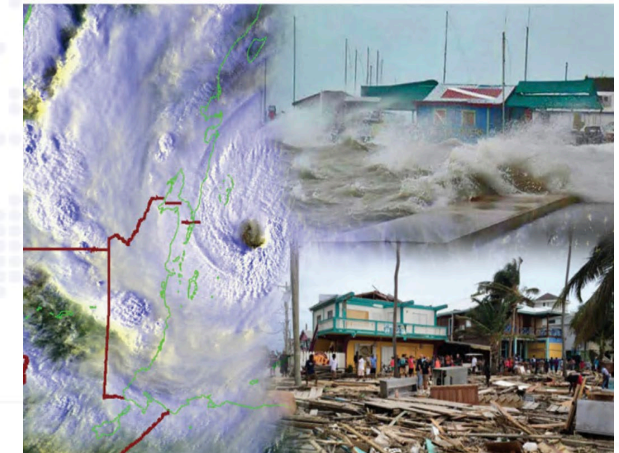
GUIDING POLICY DEVELOPMENT

In 2022, 30 completed projects contributed to a wide range of Member States' needs on policy development. These include:

- A Labour Mobility Reintegration Strategy in **Tuvalu**
- An Action Plan to Address Internal Migration in the Context of Disasters and Climate Change in **Belize**
- A National Labour Migration Policy in **Burundi**
- A National Policy on Migrant Health in **Cambodia**
- A Migration Profile in **Nepal**

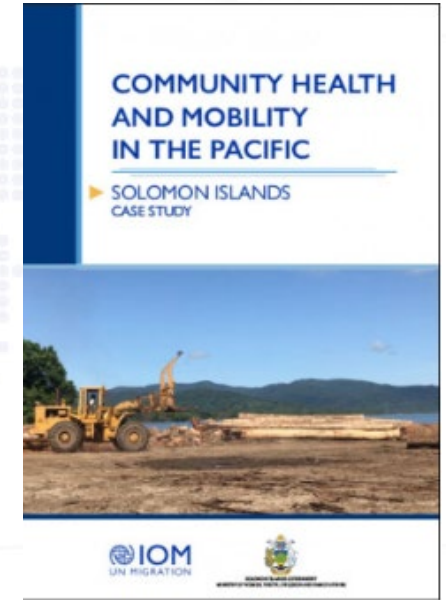
THE IMPACT OF SEED FUNDING

Project completed in 2022 led to follow-up interventions. A few highlights:

In **Belize**, seed funding led to 2.3 million from EU focused on building resilience to displaced persons to avoid further displacement due to the effects of climate change.

In the **Solomon Islands**, two follow-up interventions from the EU and UNPBF – one focused on gender-responsive peacebuilding in extractive industries and the other on strengthening capacities on preventing TIP and GBV to protect survivors.

A regional project involving the Governments of **Tuvalu, Tonga and Vanuatu** led to commitment from the Migration Multi-Partner Trusts Fund, as well as the Government of Australia to support the efforts to harness the potential of labour migration in the Pacific.



PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

Several trends stand out among the completed projects in 2022:



26% of the projects completed in 2022 included a **clear technology component**.



In 2022, **12% of completed projects engaged with youth or gender as a target beneficiary** – and often in innovative ways.



46% of projects completed in 2022 contributed to **policy development**, demonstrating the Fund's continued role in supporting Member States' needs on policy development.



Keeping in line with results from 2021, **the Fund saw eight (12%) Migration and Climate change projects** completed in 2022.

ENHANCING GENDER EQUALITY



The Fund continues to use the IOM Gender Marker for all its projects, and **all are developed to reach at a minimum the IOM Gender Marker code of “2a”.**



Guidance is provided to mainstream and integrate gender into all projects.

In addition to training and guidelines, gender is mainstreamed into all proposal inputs.

REVIEWS – 2015-2020 PROJECTS

The **Labour Migration Review** noted that:

- **78** per cent - reached all of their intended outcomes and produced all of their expected outputs.
- **100** per cent - at least one outcome being sustained following the completion of the project.
- **89** per cent of the projects - reached all intended beneficiaries. 7 per cent of completed projects also reached unintended beneficiaries.

The **Immigration and Border Governance Review** noted that:

- **71** per cent - featured innovative approaches.
- **100** per cent - at least one outcome being sustained following the completion of the project.
- **65** per cent of the projects - reached all of their intended outcomes and produced all of their expected outputs

- Key institutional player in the roll-out of the Strategic Results Framework (SRF).

- 100% of projects tagged relevant SRF Short-Term Outcome(s) and integrated at least one SRF standardized indicator per Results Matrix Outcome → Reporting on IOM's work
