# **Thirty-fifth Session**

IOM DEVELOPMENT FUND

(Status report: 1 January to 30 September 2024)

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#### Background

1. An overview of the IOM Development Fund, which was established through Council Resolution No. 1035 of 29 November 2000, is provided at the sessions of the Standing Committee on Programmes and Finance.

2. The allocation and application of the Fund is guided by Council Resolution No. 1390 of 24 November 2020 on budget regulations and practices.<sup>1</sup>

3. The Guidance Note on the IOM Development Fund explains the characteristics of the Fund and provides practical guidance on its operations and management. It can be consulted in the Organization's three official languages on the <u>IOM Development Fund website</u>.

4. With regard to the Fund's two lines of funding, Line 2 is broadly similar in its operation to Line 1, with one of the key provisos being that Member States subject to Article 4 of the IOM Constitution are not eligible to benefit from funding under Line 2.<sup>2</sup>

#### Fund administration

5. In 2024, a total of USD 18,417,278 (including administrative costs) is available for the IOM Development Fund. A total of USD 1,578,925 is available for Line 1 funding, comprising USD 1,400,000 in Operational Support Income (see document C/112/3) and USD 178,925 in funds recovered from closed Line 1 projects. A total of USD 16,838,353 is available for Line 2 funding, comprising USD 13,600,000 in Operational Support Income; USD 2,445,067 in funds recovered from closed Line 2 projects; USD 39,600 from the Government of Austria, USD 689,700 from the Government of Belgium, USD 10,000 from the Government of the Philippines and USD 53,937 from the Government of Portugal (all allocated via the Migration Resource Allocation Committee (MIRAC)); and USD 49 of private contributions made by individuals online.

6. Continuing the trend of recent years, project funding requests increased in 2024, mainly as a result of the growing need of eligible Member States for seed funding to address various migration management challenges. Project proposals have been received for capacity-development support in the following areas: community development; disaster risk reduction; durable solutions; environment

and climate change; health promotion and assistance for migrants; immigration and border management; immigration and visas; integration and social cohesion; international migration law; labour migration; migration data; activities supporting the United Nations Network on Migration; migration policy; migration research and publications; protection and assistance for migrants in situations of vulnerability; return and reintegration assistance; and transfer of migrants' knowledge and resources to their country of origin.

7. All projects approved by the IOM Development Fund are aligned with relevant objectives and principles contained in the IOM Migration Governance Framework, the IOM Strategic Plan 2024–2028, the IOM Institutional Strategy on Migration and Sustainable Development and the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. The Fund continues to be a vital means of advancing migration and sustainable development policies and programmes.

8. Actual financial allocations against available funding are on schedule, with 78 per cent of the overall funding having been allocated by the end of the third quarter of 2024. As at 30 September 2024, 214 active projects were being administered.

## Piloting the Strategic Results Framework


9. IOM is transitioning towards more evidence-based, results-oriented programming and reporting processes. A key aim is to strengthen IOM monitoring and reporting mechanisms by aligning them with institutional priorities, thus enhancing the effectiveness and impact of the reports presented to Member States and the broader United Nations system. This transition is supported by streamlined data collection, reducing reliance on manual surveys and field data requests. A major focus was the roll-out of the IOM Strategic Results Framework to improve institutional reporting in accordance with results-based management principles.

10. In coordination with the Strategic Planning and Results Division and the Project Information and Management Application (PRIMA) team, the IOM Development Fund piloted the integration of the Strategic Results Framework into its 183 projects between 2022 and 2024 (Figure 1) in preparation for the global roll-out of the Framework in April 2024. The IOM Development Fund was selected to conduct the pilot due to the wide reach of its projects, its structured monitoring practices and its advanced review processes. A Migration Resource Allocation Committee project (project code MM.0067) provided resources to ensure the success of the pilot for the period between March 2023 and June 2024.

11. The Migration Resource Allocation Committee project provided resources for targeted capacity development through the IOM Development Fund for regional and country office staff, equipping them with tools and guidance to integrate the Strategic Results Framework into their respective IOM Development Fund projects. Key accomplishments included the integration of the Strategic Results Framework into all of the 183 IOM Development Fund projects established during the pilot period of 2022–2024 (Figure 2, example from 2023), and the provision of tailored capacity-strengthening support for 519 IOM staff in 89 missions across all regions of the globe.

12. In all cases, project development officers in each mission received training through global sessions at the beginning of each proposal development period and individual support and training throughout the project development process, including specific sessions focused on the integration of the Strategic Results Framework into the proposal drafting process. Additional training sessions have been held regularly to focus on monitoring and reporting and 161 interim reports have been received,

reviewed and approved for projects into which the Strategic Results Framework has been integrated. The results of these efforts contributed greatly to the global launch of the Strategic Results Framework in April 2024.

13. The Migration Resource Allocation Committee project also facilitated two high-level workshops with the Strategic Planning and Results Division, the IOM Development Fund, the PRIMA team and key regional office staff to ensure a coordinated and integrated approach to the global rollout of the Strategic Results Framework. Six in-person capacity-development sessions were conducted in key regional and country offices, including the Regional Office in Nairobi, the Regional Office in Dakar, the Regional Office in Brussels, the Regional Office in Vienna, the IOM Office in Türkiye and the IOM Office in Mozambique, alongside virtual training sessions to cover the remaining regional offices. Five model projects were also developed through the project in 2023, serving as blueprints for project proposals into which the Strategic Results Framework was integrated and contributing to the improved efficiency of the proposal development and endorsement process. These models were applied to multiple 2024 IOM Development Fund proposals, streamlining the project review process and improving proposal consistency.

14. In addition to these capacity-strengthening efforts, an external review and an internal after-action review were conducted to assess the project's effectiveness and identify the lessons learned. The external review, conducted in 2023, gathered insights from IOM staff globally and highlighted the robustness of the Strategic Results Framework pilot as a foundation for global implementation of the Framework. The after-action review involved the IOM Development Fund, the Strategic Planning and Results Division and PRIMA team, and identified good practices and recommendations for the next stages of the global roll-out of the Strategic Results Framework. A key recommendation from both reviews was to address the capacity gaps that remain among regional endorsers, namely the regional thematic specialists, related to project design and monitoring of the Strategic Results Framework indicators on PRIMA, which could ultimately undermine the entire process.

15. Overall, the project successfully stress-tested the Strategic Results Framework for global use and demonstrated its value in enhancing institutional reporting. It also provided valuable insights to refine the integration of the Strategic Results Framework into IOM projects in the future. Although the pilot phase has ended, the IOM Development Fund continues to collaborate with the Strategic Planning and Results Division and PRIMA team to support the ongoing integration of the Strategic Results Framework into the Organization's global operations.

## Mapping of policy projects

16. Providing advice and support for evidence-based migration policy processes, for both overarching and sectoral policies, is a key part of IOM's mandate and is instrumental to the Organization's mission of promoting humane and orderly migration for the benefit of migrants and societies. The Fund is a major source of funding for the policymaking support that IOM provides. In partnership with the Policy Support and Coordination Unit, the Fund developed a methodological approach to map all projects with a policy component funded from 2021 to 2023. To effectively communicate the mapping results, the Fund collaborated with the Online Communications Unit to create a virtual map that visually represents the outcomes of the mapping exercise. Currently, this map showcases projects with a policy component supported by the Fund, which can be filtered by key variables such as region, country, thematic area, policy type and governance level.

17. The map can be found on the <u>IOM Development Fund website</u>.

#### Awareness-raising and fundraising initiatives

18. The two awareness-raising and fundraising campaigns entitled "Look Forward Give Back" and "Think About Tomorrow, Act Today" are being expanded to include other active and relevant projects. Footage and materials from these campaigns will be used at upcoming events including the Twentyninth Conference of the Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (COP 29). The Fund is also focusing its efforts on a third campaign to raise the profile of entrepreneurship for sustainable development. The campaign aims to raise awareness about IOM work and demonstrate the positive contribution of migrants and migration to society.

## Evaluations

19. The IOM Development Fund is committed to undertaking ex-post evaluations of all completed funded projects. The findings and recommendations are shared regularly at the sessions of the Standing Committee on Programmes and Finance. In 2024, USD 84,578 was allocated for the Fund's ex-post evaluations. Furthermore, an evaluation of the Fund as a whole is being conducted. The overall objective of the evaluation is to assess the relevance, coherence, efficiency, effectiveness, impact and sustainability of the criteria, guidelines and administrative management of the Fund, considering its alignment with the IOM Strategic Plan 2024–2028 and the Strategic Results Framework 2024. The evaluation will use a combination of methods including semi-structured interviews and online surveys. IOM staff and external stakeholders will be consulted and on-site visits will be conducted in four case study countries: Albania, Kenya, Mexico and Sri Lanka. A four-person team from an evaluation and research consultancy has been mandated to carry out this evaluation from June to October 2024.

#### Staff support for the IOM Development Fund

20. The Junior Professional Officer funded by the Government of Japan has been a vital member of the IOM Development Fund Unit, reviewing project applications and reports, carrying out project performance reviews and developing the draft strategic plan for the Fund.
